Now it is almost summer, and I must confess that this issue is just a bit delayed, because I have been learning how to do desktop publishing with a new laser printer, and I have been learning the ins and the outs. So forgive me for a short delay because of the recent purchase of the laser printer. It should come easier as time goes on, and perhaps you will be receiving shorter and more frequent issues of <u>Umbrella</u> because of it. Frankly, we need more subscribers—if it were not for the libraries, <u>Umbrella</u> would not have a reason for being.
