Louise Nevelson has designed the plaque that goes to each winner of the American Book Awards, given for the first time this year for the past year's best offerings in 34 categories.

Miles Barth, formerly of the Art Institute of Chicago, has been named the first curator of the collections at the International Center of Photography in New York City. Barth will oversee a new archival program.

Norman Mingo, 84, creator of the slightly leering face of Alfred E. Neuman as the trademark of Mad Magazine, died recently in White Plains.

Richard Anuszkiewicz, painter, was one of the recipients of the 1980 arts awards from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters. Charmion von Wiegand and Marion Lerner Levine were also award-winners.

Jakob Rosenberg, 86, a leading authority on the works of Rembrandt and a teacher of a generation of print curators throughout the country, died recently in Cambridge, MA.

Luis Barragan, 78, a leading Mexican architect whose almost surreal designs evolve in large measure from rural Mexican architecture, won the world's richest architectural award, the \$100,000 Pritzker Architecture Prize.

Ansel Adams, renowned photographer, recently appeared before a Senate subcommittee to help save Big Sur from the developers.

Tohei Horiike recently returned to Japan after a year's sojourn in the United States, mostly in California. His Art Documentation '80 show opened in late April at Gallery Maki in Tokyo and on 11 May he was married in the traditional Japanese ritual. Rosalie Onorato, circulation director of Artforum magazine from 1975 to 1979, died of leukemia recently in New York City at the age of 31.
